Synopsis

It's springtime in 1962 at the New York City firm of Mantua and Son. The rakish Duke of Mantua cuts a swath across the office floor, shielded by his family connections and encouraged by his longtime friend, Rigoletto, the company janitor. The father of one of his conquests, who also happens to be the director of human resources, Monterone, speaks out against the Duke's womanizing and adolescent behavior. As a result, Monterone is served his pink slip. As he's escorted from the building, Monterone curses Rigoletto and the Duke for their improper and sinister behavior. The Duke, never one to suffer to consequences, laughs at the curse; Rigoletto, who has been sheltering his beloved daughter from the outside world, becomes fearful that the curse may hold some weight.

Through events that the unsuspecting Rigoletto put in motion, he finds that his own naive and sheltered daughter, Gilda, has been kidnapped by scornful coworkers and delivered to the Duke. Upon discovering that his daughter's virtue has been destroyed, Rigoletto swears revenge and hires Sparafucile to assassinate the Duke. Events come to a head in the midst of a great storm, with some of the most beautiful and gripping music ever written for the stage.

About the Capri Theater

Built in 1927, the Capri is one of the last vaudeville-cinema hybrid theatres built in Minneapolis. Prince gave his first solo concerts here on January 5 & 6, 1979, playing a set list starting with "For You", "Soft and Wet", "So Blue", and "Just as Long as We're Together". (Ticket price: \$4.) The evening was billed as a benefit concert for the Capri, but its true purpose was actually to reassure Prince's agent that the 20-year-old artist was ready for a national concert tour. It went smashingly.
